Purpose –

To allow children an opportunity to get involved in the Fair by showing livestock in a non-competitive, positive experience.

Who Shows?

Children ages 5-9, who have worked with the animal prior to the Fair.

How Is It Set Up?

- Children need to have a parent/guardian or older teenage sibling at ringside or in the ring when the child and animal are in the ring.
- The animal needs to be shown with a halter (rope or leather); adult may assist.
- The animals are the youngest class of animals allowed in the species: beef and dairy cattle – junior calf; sheep – young lamb; goats – kid (youngest class)
- The animals will be brought the day of the show and taken home the same day. There will be a designated area for the Little Britches animals on Sunday morning.
- The “judge” has the child and animal circle in the ring (child has the option of posing the animal or not) and then the judge will ask each exhibitor questions related to the animal:

“What is your name?”

“What is your animal’s name?”

“How old is your animal?”

“What does your animal eat?”

“How much does your animal weigh?”

“Do you like showing at the Fair?”

- Each child is given a participation ribbon and items donated from area businesses. Each child will enter the arena, pick up their show tag, get a photo with their animal (while the one class is showing the next class is getting their photo), then enter the show arena when group is called.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Please Read Carefully

I. EXHIBITOR ELIGIBILITY:

All Open Division & Senior Citizens Division exhibits limited to Polk County residents only. Junior Division exhibits limited to members of youth organizations based in Polk County. All students, grades 3-12, in schools in Polk County or residents of Polk County can enter in Junior Division Department 35J.

II. STALL, PEN & CAGE RENTAL FEES

Submit appropriate fees with entry form.

III. ENTRIES

Use entry forms found in this fair book or distributed by youth organization leaders. **Make out entry form in ink or type. Please do not use pencil.**

Fill in the department number, class, lot number and description of each exhibit on the entry form. An exhibitor is limited to enter 23 exhibits.

Youth may enter exhibits in either Junior Division or Open Division, but not in both.

Make sure you have each exhibit entered correctly on your entry form before submitting it. **Make a record of your exhibit entries to keep at home. No changes will be made to fair entry forms after July 17th, 2009.**

An exhibitor may enter only one exhibit for each lot number. (Exception: Open Division dairy, beef, swine, sheep, dairy goat and horse exhibitors may enter two in a lot number.)

Please check entry tags for accuracy. Changes can only be made if an error has been determined by the Superintendent of Entries. Only the Superintendent of Entries can make these changes and must initial all changes on entry tags and judging sheets.

All exhibitors of animals in purebred lot numbers must show registration paper to fair officials at the fair. Animal

health papers must be shown to fair officials upon arrival at the fairgrounds. Be sure to read and comply with the animal health regulations provided in this book.

Animals must be in the show ring promptly after being called. Any exhibitor failing to comply will be excluded from competing. No one, except exhibitors of animals, judge(s), and fair officials, will be allowed inside a show ring during the exhibition.

Check the judging schedule for the date, time and type of judging. It is your responsibility to bring exhibits that are to be judged face-to-face to the judge for judging during the appropriate judging time.

Only exhibited animals will be allowed on the fairgrounds (except in the official youth "kiddie" barn).

No selling of exhibited animals (except quality meats) until after 4:30 p.m. on Sunday, August 2.

Exhibits are to be entered in the name of the owner. Junior Division exhibitors may enter and show managerial animals provided a managerial agreement was in effect prior to May 1. Any infraction of ownership rules shall cause forfeiture of premiums.

All animals entered in purebred lot numbers must be registered with their respective American Registry organization. Certificates of registry or evidence of pure breeding will, in all cases, be required for examination by fair officials at the fair.

Articles not listed in this premium book can be brought to the fair for exhibition. No premiums will be paid on articles not listed in this book.

Completed entry form, Junior Division Department 35 School Exhibit entry form, exhibitor season gate admission ticket fee, stall, pen and cage rental fees must be submitted by June 12, 2009. None will be accepted for exhibition if postmarked after June 12, 2009. (Exceptions: Open Division Department 6 Horse entries are made on show day, August 1 & August 2).

Exhibitors making entries and then not exhibiting at the fair shall forfeit all stall and cage fees as well as the cost of the exhibitor season gate admission ticket. This exhibitor ticket can be obtained from the Superintendent of Entries on the first day of the fair.

Be sure to read and comply with all animal health regulations in this book.

IV. EXHIBITING AT THE FAIR

Please read this section carefully as there have been significant changes with the addition of the Wednesday entry day.

Exhibitors must bring exhibits to the appropriate building or conference judging area between 1 p.m. and 7 p.m. on Wednesday, July 29. The following are exceptions to this requirement:

1. Junior, open and senior citizen flowers and house plants (Dept. 15J, 15, 150) must be in place by 6 p.m. on Wednesday, July 29.
2. Dairy, beef and llamas must be unloaded and stalled by noon on Thursday, July 30. They may be brought in on Wednesday if desired.
3. Market hogs must be unloaded and in pens by 6 p.m. on Wednesday, July 29. The weigh-in is from 7-9 p.m.

All exhibits must remain in place at the fairgrounds until 4:30 p.m. on the closing day of the fair.

Exhibitors need to pick up their envelope containing entry tags and exhibitor gate admission tickets at the Superintendent of Entries Office. Entry tags must be attached to exhibits or cages. Please check entry tags for accuracy. Animal exhibitors should have entry tags in their possession when showing their animals.

Entry forms, entry tags and entries on judge's sheets cannot be changed unless an error was made by the computing center or the Superintendent of Entries. Only the Superintendent of Entries can make these changes and must initial all changes on entry tags and judging sheets.

All exhibitors of animals in purebred lot numbers must show registration papers to fair officials at the fair. Animal health papers must be shown to fair officials upon arrival at fairgrounds or as otherwise directed.

No one, except the Superintendent of Entries and Department Superintendents or their assistants may handle and examine judging sheets until placing for all lot numbers are recorded.

Check the judging schedule and ask superintendents when lot numbers will be judged. Animals must be in the show ring promptly after being called. Any exhibitor failing to comply will be excluded from competing. In Junior Division conference judged lot numbers, exhibitors are expected to bring exhibits to the judge for judging.

No one, except exhibitors of animals, judge(s), and fair officials will be allowed inside a show arena during the exhibition.

Overnight barn permits will be limited. Youth interested in staying in the barns must register with their leader or advisor prior to the fair. Animal numbers will be utilized in determining the number of youth permitted overnight barn passes. Any changes during the fair must be approved by the Extension Office.

V. JUDGES AND JUDGING

Judges will be selected from outside Polk County as is feasible. The most highly qualified judges available will be engaged.

Regular judging and placing is followed in Open and Senior Citizens Divisions. This procedure is one first place, one second place, one third place, and one fourth place premium will be paid in each lot number.

Danish judging procedures are described in ATCP 160.92(3)(a) on page 20.

Face-to-Face judging procedure in the Junior Division is:

Where the exhibitor brings the exhibit to the judge.
Judge discusses exhibit quality with exhibitor.
Judge places the exhibit in the appropriate award group according to or comparing it to a standard of perfection or the ideal.

When there is but one exhibitor competing in a lot number, the judge may award a premium placing that the exhibit merits according to or comparing to a standard of perfection or ideal.

Judges are instructed in cases of attempted interference on the part of exhibitors or members of their families with the judges' deliberations and decisions, to exclude parties so offending from competition in that particular lot number.

All protests against awards made must be in writing and signed by the party deeming him/herself aggrieved. A protest must be delivered to the Fair Secretary within two days after the award was made. A protest shall include specifications of charges and/or grounds of complaint and the name(s), address(es), and phone number(s) of witness(es). The Fair Secretary shall present the protest to the Board of Directors for review, discussion and decision.

VI. GENERAL

The general supervision of the exhibition is vested in the Officers and Board of Directors of the Polk County Fair Society. Exhibitors or others desirous of special privileges must apply to the Officers or Board of Directors.

Careless driving on or near the fairgrounds is prohibited by law.

State Statutes regarding consumption and possession of alcoholic beverages will be enforced on the fairgrounds. Any exhibitor found in violation of the Statute will not receive premiums earned.

Premium checks will be distributed in October or November. Please cash them promptly. In the event State Aid for premiums is not received, reduced premiums may be paid to exhibitors.

VII. PETS ON FAIRGROUNDS

The only live animal pets allowed on the fairgrounds are those officially entered under an appropriate lot number to be shown and judged.

VIII. LIABILITY NOTICE

In no case shall the Polk County Fair Society or any of its officers, directors or superintendents be held responsible for any loss, damage, injury or death by disease, theft or from any other cause of any character to any property while same is on the fairgrounds or any other time or place. The management hereby assumes no responsibility either as bailee or otherwise for any property being brought or kept on said ground.

If the property owners or others interested in the property desire protection against loss, damage or injury from fire or from any other cause, they must make their own arrangements, and pay for such insurance.

In no case shall the Polk County Fair Society or any of its officers, directors, superintendents or volunteers be held responsible or liable for any loss, damage, or injury sustained by any exhibitor.

Exhibitors making entries and not exhibiting shall forfeit all fees for stalls, pens or space and exhibitor's tickets.

IX. INTERPRETATION OF RULES AND REGULATIONS

The Board of Directors and Officers reserve the full and absolute right to interpret the foregoing rules and regulations, and to arbitrarily settle and determine matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, or connected with, or incident to the fair.

X. CAMPING ON FAIRGROUNDS

No camping is allowed on the fairgrounds except for animal exhibitor families. Animal exhibitor family campsites are about 12 feet in width.

Campsite fees are \$25.00 without electrical hookup and \$70.00 with electrical hookup.

Campsite reservations must be made by sending your completed application form (below) with your check for either \$25.00 or \$70.00 made payable to Polk County Fair Society by **June 15th**. Applications received after June 15th will be considered as late entries and will be given what sites that have not been reserved.

Camping number and vehicle pass will be mailed to you after we have received your completed application and payment in full.

IX. INTERPRETATION OF RULES AND REGULATIONS

The Board of Directors and Officers reserve the full and absolute right to interpret the foregoing rules and regulations, and to arbitrarily settle and determine matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, or connected with, or incident to the fair.

REGULATIONS FOR STATE AID

Governing County & District Fair

Wisconsin Administrative Code
Chapter ATCP 160

ATCP 160.01 DEFINITIONS. as used in this chapter:

(1) "Class" means a grouping in which exhibits may be entered, including an animal breed or age group for animal exhibits; a type of produce, crop or food; or a specific age, age group or educational grade level of exhibitor.

(2) "Department" as it relates to the organizational structure of a fair, means an animal species, production group, or other principal classification of exhibits. As used in any other context, "department" means the state of Wisconsin department of agriculture, trade and consumer protection.

(3) "Division" means one of three exhibitor group classifications for a fair and is limited to junior division, open division and senior citizens division.

(4) "Lot" or "lot number" means the numerical designation assigned by a local fair for a specific category of exhibits within a class.

(5) "Premium" means a monetary prize that a county or district fair awards to an exhibitor after judging all competing exhibits in the class to which the premium pertains.

ATCP 160.02 PREMIUM REQUIREMENTS. (1) GENERAL. (a) The state aid authorized by s.93.23 (1), Stats., may be paid only on net premiums, which consist of total premiums paid less total entry fees received. The department may withhold state premium aid from any fair which does not enforce the animal health provisions required under Ch. ATCP 10 for all classes of livestock exhibited at the fair. State aid will be paid only on premiums actually paid by bank check or draft.

(b) No deductions may be made from premium money won by an exhibitor. Premiums may, however, be withheld where exhibition rules established by the fair association are violated. A written statement of violation shall be submitted to the department to justify action taken by a local fair.

(c) Premiums offered shall be definite in amount. No decrease or increase in published premiums may be made because of the financial condition or the organization or for any other reason.

(d) State aid may be paid on no more than 2 premiums awarded an exhibitor under one premium or lot number in open division individual livestock classes, except poultry and rabbits, and no more than one premium in all other classes, including poultry and rabbits.

(e) No county or district fair may receive state aid for a premium awarded to any exhibitor in the open division if that exhibitor entered the same exhibit in the junior division at the same county or district fair. This paragraph does not apply if the exhibit was entered in the junior division only as part of a herd group, carcass class or performance class.

(f) No state aid will be paid on the cost of ribbons, cups, trophy prizes or entertainment contests.

(2) PREMIUM LISTS. (a) Premiums for which state aid is requested by county and district fairs shall conform with the uniform premium list and other requirements set forth in these rules. Fairs requesting state aid for net premiums shall submit to the department a printed copy of the premium list used at the fair, as required under s. ATCP 160.92 (3) (d).

(b) The officers of each fair shall mail a copy of the premium list to other associations, societies, or boards conducting a fair in Wisconsin upon request.

(c) Sections ATCP 160.01 through 160.07 and 160.91 shall be published in premium books used by a fair for which state aid is requested.

(3) ENTRY FEES. (a) A county or district fair may charge an exhibitor an entry fee. The entry fee may not exceed 10% of the sum of all premiums offered to exhibitors in the same class for which the entry fee is charged. In lieu of an entry fee, a county or district fair may charge stall rents for horses, cattle, sheep, goats, swine, poultry, rabbits or pets. Stall rents shall not exceed \$1.50 per single stall or animal or \$3.00 per box stall for horses; \$1.00 per single stall or animal or \$2.00 per box stall for cattle; or \$0.50 per animal or \$2.00 per pen for swine, goats or sheep. A standard pen for swine, goats or sheep is approximately 64 square feet. Cage rents may not exceed \$0.50 per head for poultry, rabbit or pet exhibits.

(b) Exhibitors in educational and school departments shall not be required to purchase an exhibitor's ticket. Any other exhibitor may be required, if no entry fee is charged, to purchase an exhibitor's season ticket at a price not to exceed that charged for a non-exhibitor's season ticket.

(4) SPLIT FAIR DATES. No state aid may be paid to fairs having split dates, unless prior written approval is granted by the department. Extreme hardship must be established by the fair organization before approval can be granted. A split date is one where exhibits or contests are judged, and premiums paid at more than one time or at more than one location during the current year. When split dates are approved, all blue ribbon winners shall be required to repeat their demonstration or exhibit at the regular fair dates, unless exempted by the department in hardship cases. The repeated demonstration or exhibit may be presented through the use of audio-visual media, still photography or an educational display. Split date approval may not be required for clothing revue, demonstration, favorite foods revue or dogs and small animals.

ATCP 160.03 EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS: A county or district fair shall meet all of the exhibition requirements of this section to be eligible for state premium aid.

(1) No fair society or other organization sponsoring a county or district fair shall require an exhibitor to become a member of the organization in order to enter an exhibit at the fair, nor shall the sponsoring organization make any deduction from an exhibitor's premium as a donation to the fair society, or require an exhibitor in any other way to make a donation to the society.

(2) State aid may not be approved for out-of-state exhibits or for separate classes of local and non-local exhibitors. Aid may not be approved for payment of premiums to an exhibitor having an out-of-state address but claiming Wisconsin residency unless the fair secretary provides the department with an affidavit that the exhibitor's residence is geographically located within the state.

(3) State aid may be paid only on articles or animals actually on display in an exhibit building or actually shown in the show ring on regular fair dates unless approval for split fair dates is obtained under s. ATCP 160.02 (4). State aid may not be paid on Dairy Herd Improvement Association records, transportation aid, production contests or other special educational exhibits unless prior approval is obtained under s. ATCP 160.04 (8).

(4) State aid may not be paid on exhibits removed from the fairgrounds before 4 p.m. of the last day of the fair, or such other later time as may be specified by the fair, without prior approval of the department. Authority for earlier removal may be granted by the department in case of meat animal sales or other special classes, if requested before the beginning of the fair. In other hardship cases, approval may be granted by the local fair. Exhibits in dog obedience and small animal pet classes may be judged during the regular fair but are not required to remain present during the entire fair. The local fair may prescribe the length of time junior fair exhibitors of horses shall keep their animals on the grounds.

ATCP 160.04 JUNIOR FAIR DIVISION; GENERAL REQUIREMENTS. (1) AGE. In the junior fair division state aid will be paid on prizes offered to exhibitors who are 8 through 19 years of age on January 1 of the current fair year, except for exhibitors under ss. ATCP 160.65 (1) and ATCP 160.80 who may be 5 through 8 years of age on January 1 of the current fair year. State aid will not be paid on prizes for club parades, club floats, song contests, or project which is not an exhibit or demonstration at the fair.

(2) All exhibitors in the junior fair division shall be members of 4-H, FFA, FHA-HERO, Scouting programs, breed groups, or any other recognized youth organization under adult leadership and with an education program approved by the local fair.

(3) Exhibits in the junior fair shall be a result of the exhibitor's own labor and may include a study, merit, or other special project, a skill area or a supervised occupational experience in which the exhibitor is regularly enrolled.

(4) State aid may be used for the payment of no more than one premium awarded an exhibitor under any one premium or lot number in the junior fair division, except when awarded as part of a group in livestock exhibits or in showmanship.

(5) Premiums in the educational department shall be paid directly to the exhibitor who made the exhibit and not to the school or teacher, except for group premiums offered to interschool competitive classes. No aid may be paid on education department premiums unless a complete list of exhibitors and a complete set of judges' sheets for the education department, similar to those required in other departments, is filed with the department. All educational exhibits shall be displayed at the fair regardless of whether they are judged prior to or at the fair.

(6) If 16 or more animals, items or articles are entered in any junior fair class, the class may be divided into 2 or more approximately equal groups according to weight, age or other identifying characteristic and each group judged as a class.

(7) Special educational exhibits may be established if the proposal is presented to the Wisconsin association of fairs before October 1 of the year preceding its proposed establishment and the exhibit is approved by the department.

(8) Within any junior fair department under subch. IV, a county or district fair may establish special classes where none are specified under subch. IV. Special classes may include classes for grade and crossbred females in the beef, swine, sheep and horse departments. Premiums for special classes created under this subsection shall be equal to premiums for comparable classes established in the same department under subch. IV.

ATCP 160.05 OPEN DIVISION; GENERAL REQUIREMENTS. (1) The total maximum premiums set forth for all places in any open division livestock class, excluding poultry and rabbits, may be divided into premiums for a greater number of places, but the maximum premium offered for any additional place shall not be higher than the maximum for last place in the class.

(2) State aid for premiums awarded for horses in open division classes shall be limited to horses which are owned by the exhibitor.

(3) All animals in any open division class shall be owned by the exhibitor, except as provided in s. ATCP 160.09.

ATCP 160.06 SENIOR CITIZENS DIVISION; GENERAL REQUIREMENTS. (1) The age of exhibitors in the senior citizens division is limited to persons 62 years of age and over.

(2) Exhibitors in the senior citizens division may not enter identical items or articles in both the senior citizens division and in the corresponding classes of the regular open division.

ATCP 160.07 CLASSES; GENERAL REQUIREMENTS. (1) Classes may be combined if the number of entries in several single classes is insufficient. If any classes are combined, state aid shall be limited to the maximum total premiums listed for a single class of animals, items or articles in that department.

(2)(a) Except as provided under par. (b), no county or district fair may receive state aid for premiums awarded for sexually intact male dairy cattle, beef cattle, sheep, goats, swine or horses unless those animals are registered purebreds. Registered purebred status shall be documented by a certificate or registry from the appropriate breed association or society, or by a copy of the application for registration.

(b) Paragraph (a) does not apply to dairy cattle exhibited at a county or district fair if a national breed association certifies that those dairy cattle are recorded in that breed association's qualified herd book which records the genealogy of that breed.

(3) Any animal entered as part of a group class may also be exhibited in a class for individual animals.

(4) Boars may not be entered as an exhibit in the swine department unless their tusks have been removed.

ATCP 160.08 CLASS DEFINITIONS; INDIVIDUAL CLASSES. (1) Dairy cattle. (a) A spring calf is one born on or after March 1 of the exhibit year.

(b) A winter calf is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year.

(c) A fall calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(d) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between June 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(e) A spring yearling is one whose date of birth is between March 1 and May 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(f) A winter yearling is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(g) A fall yearling is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.

(h) A 2 year-old is one born between September 1 of the third year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year. A 2 year-old includes a yearling that has freshened.

(i) A 3 year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the third year preceding the exhibit year.

(j) A 4 year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fifth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year.

(2) Beef cattle. (a) A junior calf is one born on or after January 1 of the exhibit year. The calf shall be at least 4 months old at the time of exhibit.

(b) A senior calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(c) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between May 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(d) A junior yearling is one whose date of birth is between January 1 and April 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(e) A senior yearling is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and December 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.

(f) A 2 year-old or older cow is one born before September 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and which has calved during the past year.

(3) Steers. (a) A senior calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(b) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between May 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year, and which has all milk teeth in place.

(c) A junior yearling is one whose date of birth is between January 1 and April 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year, and which has all milk teeth solidly in place and shows no nicking at the gums.

(4) Swine. (a) A junior yearling boar or sow is one born between January 1 and June 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(b) A senior boar or sow is one whose date of birth is between July 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(c) A senior spring boar or sow pig is one whose date of birth is between January 1 and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year. A local board may subdivide this entry class into January-born and February-born sows or boars.

(d) A junior spring boar or sow pig is one born during the month of March of the exhibit year.

(5) Sheep. (a) A spring lamb is one born on or after February 16 of the exhibit year.

(b) A fall lamb is one born between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(c) A winter lamb is one born between January 1 and February 15 of the exhibit year.

(d) A yearling ram or ewe is one born outside the date of birth limitations in pars. (a) through (c). The age of yearlings may be subject to verification by a veterinarian's examination whose findings shall be final.

(e) A market lamb is one born after January 1 of the exhibit year.

(6) Goats. Goats may be entered in one of the following individual classes. The age of the animal for determining the appropriate class shall be computed from the opening day of the fair. Male goats and goats with full natural horns may not be entered unless full natural horns are a standard for a specific breed. Does which have freshened shall be shown in the appropriate class under subds. 5 to 8.

- (a) Junior doe kid; under 4 months of age.
- (b) Senior doe kid; at least 4 months but under 7 months of age.
- (c) Junior yearling doe; at least 7 months but under 12 months of age.
- (d) Senior yearling doe; at least 12 months but under 24 months of age and the doe is not in milk.
- (e) Yearling milker; under 2 years of age and in milk.
- (f) Junior milker; at least 2 years but under 3 years of age.
- (g) Mature milker; at least 3 years but under 5 years of age.
- (h) Aged milker; 5 years of age and older.

ATCP 160.09 CLASS DEFINITIONS; GROUP CLASSES. (1) Dairy and beef cattle. (a) A dairy junior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of the same bull. All of these animals shall be under 2 years of age, and not more than one may be a bull. A beef junior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of the same bull and are animals in the junior calf, senior calf, and/or the summer yearling, bull and heifer classes with both sexes to be represented.

(b) A dairy and beef senior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of one sire. All of these animals shall be 2 years of age or over. In either a dairy or beef breed get of sire, the name of the sire shall be designated by the exhibitor. The animals need not be owned by a single exhibitor.

(c) A produce of dam shall consist of 2 animals of any age or sex which are the product of one cow.

(d) A group of 3 best female cattle shall consist of 3 animals of any age which were bred and are owned by the exhibitor.

(2) Swine. A pen of 3 feeder pigs shall consist of swine of either sex each weighing between 40 and 60 pounds. Any male pigs included in the pen shall be castrated and healed.

(3) Sheep. (a) A get of sire shall consist of 4 lambs or yearlings, or both, of either sex, from one sire, which were bred and are owned by the exhibitor.

(b) An exhibitor's flock shall consist of one yearling or ram lamb, 2 yearling ewes and 2 ewe lambs which are owned by the exhibitor.

(c) A junior division pair of lambs may include a spring or fall ram and spring or fall ewe lamb owned by the exhibitor.

(d) A junior division flock shall be comprised of 3 sheep consisting of a yearling or lamb ram, a ewe lamb, and a yearling ewe, all of which are owned by the exhibitor.

(4) Goats. (a) An exhibitor's herd shall consist of one doe under one year of age, one yearling doe and one doe 2 years old or older, all of which are owned by the exhibitor.

(b) A senior get of sire shall consist of 3 does which are the get of one sire, with at least one in milk. The animals need not be owned by the same exhibitor, but all shall be in the senior age group.

(c) A junior get of sire shall consist of 3 does under 2 years of age which have never freshened and are the get of one sire. The animals need not be owned by the same exhibitor.

(d) A produce of dam shall consist of 2 does of any age which are the produce of one doe. Both animals shall be owned by the same exhibitor.

(e) A dam and daughter shall consist of one doe of any age and its dam. The animals need not be owned by the same exhibitor.

ATCP 160.91 JUDGING REGULATIONS. (1) Judging shall be done at county and district fairs by individuals who are registered with the department and who have knowledge, training or experience in the specific class or classes to be judged as determined by the department. Judging shall be done in accordance with the requirements of ATCP 160.92 (3) (a). In no case shall any person who is an officer or director of a fair be eligible to judge exhibits at such fair; nor shall any person interested directly or indirectly in exhibits shown in any department of a fair be eligible to judge articles or animals in that department.

(2) Each judge at a county or district fair shall be provided with a copy of the fair's premium book or list of entry classes at least 7 days prior to the opening date of the fair.

(3) No animal or article, irrespective of the number of entries in the class in which it is entered, shall be awarded a higher rating than its merit would entitle it to in comparison to the standard of perfection in the class.

(4) (a) No state aid will be paid on premiums awarded under the Danish system in any classes except in the junior and educational departments.

(b) When classes in the junior and educational department are judged according to the Danish system, 4 group placing shall be awarded in any class. When there are less than 8 exhibitors in the class, there shall not be more than 2 in the first group, not more than 4 in the first 2 groups and not more than 6 in the first 3 groups. If there are 8 or more entries in the class, there shall not be more than 25% in the first group, not more than 50% in the first 2 groups, and not more than 75% in the first 3 groups.

(c) The number of awards in the last group placing may be increased to the extent necessary to give awards to all exhibitors.

(5) If any class of exhibits at a county or district fair is judged according to the regular system, the judges for that class may give only one first-place, one second-place, one third-place and one fourth-place award in that class.

ATCP 160.92 ACCOUNTING REQUIREMENTS. (1) All receipts from any source whatsoever shall be deposited in a bank, and all accounts without exception shall be paid by check or draft. All records, papers, stubs, checks, vouchers or other orders relating to fair transactions shall be preserved for a 6-year period subsequent to the year in which they were made or issued.

(2) Premiums shall be actually paid or bona fide notice of premium awards sent to all premium winners before a claim for state aid may be considered.

(3) Claims for state aid shall be filed with the department within 30 days after the close of the fair, and shall include:

(a) Judging sheets completed according to instructions contained thereon. All entries shall be in typewritten form with the exception of entries in the winning entry column which may be made with a ballpoint pen or indelible pencil. The total premium awarded on each judging sheet shall be shown at the bottom of each sheet. State aid shall not be paid on judging sheets which are not signed by the judge or accompanied by an affidavit of the judge listing the department and classes judged. A separate affidavit shall be required for each department.

(b) Index of exhibitors and their addresses, with amounts paid in premiums opposite each name. The total of each index sheet shall be shown on the bottom of the sheet, and the total of the index shall correspond with the total of premiums awarded as shown by judging sheets.

(c) One voucher claim for state aid.

(d) One premium book.

POLK COUNTY FAIR ANIMAL HEALTH REGULATIONS
2009

- (1) Exhibitors must provide and use only their own utensils and water buckets in caring for livestock. No livestock watering tanks will be allowed on the grounds.
- (2) Animals should be transported in clean and disinfected cars and trucks to and from the fair.
- (3) All interstate health certificates accompanying cattle, equine, sheep, goats, and swine, that originate outside of Wisconsin, should be approved by the chief livestock sanitary official of the state of origin prior to exhibition.
- (4) Health records must be delivered to the superintendent the first day of the fair as animals are unloaded at fairgrounds. Animals exhibited should be identified by registration name and number or by ear tag number.
- (5) Decisions of the Dr. V.M. hired by the Polk County Fair Society shall be final.
- (6) All open and junior division exhibitors are expected to abide by these regulations as well as the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture Animal Health Requirements that follow.

WISCONSIN COUNTY, DISTRICT, & STATE FAIRS 2009
ANIMAL HEALTH RULES AND REGULATIONS

If a fair or livestock exhibition lasts more than 24 hours the sponsors shall appoint a licensed Veterinarian to conduct a daily inspection of all livestock at the fair or exhibition. The Veterinarian shall review all records and test results required under ATCP 10.87. If a fair or exhibition lasts less than 24 hours, all records or test results required by ATCP 10.87 shall be reviewed by a licensed Veterinarian or by the show chairperson. Records shall include exhibitors name and address, identification of animals exhibited including number, type and description, documentation to show compliance with disease testing and other health requirements, and the livestock premises code, if any, of the premises from which the animals originate.

This is a summary of DATCP animal health requirements for exhibition only. These requirements may change due to animal disease emergence in Wisconsin or other states, for example vesicular stomatitis in the western states. It is always advisable to check with the **Division of Animal Health (608-224-4874)** for the most recent health requirements when planning to exhibit animals. **Animals meeting exhibition requirements may not meet all import or movement requirements for other purposes.**

The fair and WDATCP have the right to make such tests and examinations as may be necessary to determine the disease status of any animal exhibited and to exclude or remove any animal afflicted with or suspected of being afflicted with a contagious or infectious disease. If at any time any animal shows evidence of a contagious or infectious disease, it shall be immediately removed from the exhibit and slaughtered or quarantined as directed by the Department.

CATTLE AND BISON

Cattle affected with ringworm, warts, mange or scab may not be exhibited, unless the veterinarian in charge determines the ringworm lesions or warts are inactive and incapable of transmitting the disease. Any cattle found with ringworm, warts, mange or scab that are active shall be removed from the premises of the fair.

Cattle originating from within Wisconsin

There are no test or health document requirements for Wisconsin cattle. However, fair management is responsible for maintaining records of persons who have exhibited at the fair, the livestock premises code, if any, and the identification of animals shown for 5 years. Acceptable forms of animal identification for breeding animals are (1) an official metal ear tag, (2) a breed registration number (3) a breed registration tattoo, or (4) other identification approved by the department. For steers, either an official identification as listed for breeding animals or the ear tag applied at weigh-in may be used. Entry blanks submitted and signed by exhibitors, including one of the forms of identification listed above, will fulfill the exhibitor requirements.

Cattle originating from outside Wisconsin

A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection shall accompany all cattle documenting animal identification (see above) and all tests or certifications required. Animals must meet normal Wisconsin requirements for interstate movement.

Steers are exempt from any brucellosis test requirement.

Cattle from Brucellosis Certified Free herds in Class A states may enter Wisconsin without a prior brucellosis test if the certified herd number and the last test date appear on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

All cattle originating from **Modified Accredited Advanced** states shall have a negative tuberculosis test within 60 days of import. Call the Division of Animal Health for a current listing of these states.

Cattle imported from states not recognizing Wisconsin's Tuberculosis Free status shall be required to have a negative Tuberculosis test for cattle within 60 days of import. Call the Division of Animal Health for a list of these states or review the department's web site at www.datcp.state.wi.us. Animal Welfare & Disease, Importing Animals into Wisconsin.

Cattle originating from Tuberculosis accredited Free herds (except Michigan & Minnesota) may enter without a prior tuberculosis test if the accredited herd number appears on the certificate.

Cattle originating from Modified Accredited state (Michigan and Minnesota) must have a permit number and require special tuberculosis testing. Exhibitors should contact the Division of Animal Health at 608-224-4874, well in advance of the fair or exhibition, to determine their testing requirements. Animals for exhibition from Modified Accredited states are required to return directly to the state origin after exhibition.

Cattle from Canada may be exhibited in Wisconsin if they meet current federal requirements to cross the international border.

SWINE

Swine originating from within Wisconsin

All swine shall be accompanied by a Wisconsin **Intrastate Movement Certificate** stating that the herd of origin has been inspected on the farm within 30 days prior to the exhibition and no apparent disease has been present in the herd for the past 30 days. The certificate must also include all required test documentation.

Swine originating from outside Wisconsin

All swine shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection stating that no pseudo rabies vaccine has been administered to the swine, and contain all required test documentation.

All swine shall have a negative pseudorabies test within 30 days of arrival at the fair or originate from a qualified pseudorabies negative herd that is qualified by testing 7% of the herd each month, or originate from a commercial swine herd in a state classified as Stage IV or V. The date of the last monthly test must be included on the certificate.

Swine entering directly from a Stage II state are not eligible for show or exhibition.

SHEEP

Sheep originating from within Wisconsin

Sexually-intact sheep of any age, and all other sheep 12 months of age and older must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official individual identification. Sexually intact sheep exposed to scrapie will not be allowed to exhibit.

Sheep originating from outside Wisconsin

All sheep shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. All sheep must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official individual identification. Sheep exposed to scrapie will not be allowed to enter Wisconsin.

GOATS

Goats originating from within Wisconsin

Sexually-intact goats of any age, and all other goats 12 months of age and older must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official individual identification. Sexually intact goats exposed to scrapie will not be allowed to exhibit.

Goats originating from outside Wisconsin

All goats shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. All goats must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official individual identification. Goats exposed to scrapie will not be allowed to enter Wisconsin.

Goats originating from Modified Accredited states (**Michigan and Minnesota**) must have a permit number and require special tuberculosis testing. Exhibitors should contact the Division of Animal Health at 608-224-4874, well in advance of the fair or exhibition, to determine their testing requirements. Animals for exhibition from Modified Accredited states are required to return directly to the state origin after exhibition.

EQUINE

Equine animals originating from within Wisconsin

All equine animals shall be accompanied by documentation of a negative EIA test conducted within the current calendar year and which clearly identifies the equine by registration number, lip tattoos or freeze brand, or a complete description of the equine. Documentation must either be an original laboratory report VS 10-11 or a certificate of veterinary inspection with the negative EIA results listed.

Equine animals originating from outside Wisconsin

All equine animals shall be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) and have been tested negative for equine infectious anemia (EIA) within the current calendar year. The certificate must clearly identify the equine by a registration number, lip tattoo or freeze brand, or a complete description of the equine animal. Equines from Minnesota are exempt from the CVI requirement if all of the following apply 1) Ownership does not change while the animal is in this state; 2) the animal remains in this state for no more than 7 days; and 3) the animal is accompanied by a report of a negative equine infectious anemia test from the current calendar year.

LLAMAS AND EXOTIC RUMINANTS

Llamas, Alpacas, and Exotic Ruminants originating from within Wisconsin

There are no requirements.

Llamas and Alpacas originating from outside Wisconsin

All Llamas and Alpacas must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and have official animal identification.

Exotic Ruminants originating from within Wisconsin

There are no requirements.

Exotic Ruminants originating from outside Wisconsin

Exotic Ruminants are required to have a written import permit, must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, and have official animal identification. A negative Tuberculosis, within 60 days prior to import, and a negative Brucellosis test, within 30 days prior to import, shall be recorded on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection which is faxed to the Division of Animal Health (608-224-4871) prior to the import permit being issued.

POULTRY

All poultry and waterfowl must originate from flocks designated as U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or NPIP Affiliate flock and accompanied by a NPIP certificate or originate from a Wisconsin Tested Flock or Wisconsin Associate Flock and be accompanied by an enrollment certificate provided by the department certifying that they are a Wisconsin Tested Flock or Wisconsin Associate Flock. Sexually mature birds that do not meet these requirements may qualify with documentation of a negative test for pullorum-typhoid (and Mycoplasma gallisepticum for turkeys) conducted within 90 days prior to arrival at the exhibition, and be individually identified with a wing band or leg band. Turkeys that are not going directly to slaughter may not be commingled with other poultry. This may be accomplished by separate housing or controlling the air flow or placement and spacing to prevent movement of M. gallisepticum from other poultry to the turkeys. The fair veterinarian should make this decision.

CERVIDAE (Deer and Elk)

Cervidae originating from within Wisconsin

All Cervidae must be officially identified, be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, be enrolled in a CWD monitoring program meeting the requirements of ATCP 10.56 and originate from an accredited TB-free herd, qualified TB-free herd, monitored herd-tested within 90 days of movement, or the farm-raised deer is tested negative on two single cervical tuberculin tests conducted 90 to 270 days apart, isolated and the second test within 90 days of the date of movement.

Cervidae originating from outside Wisconsin

All Cervidae must have a pre-entry permit number from the department and approved by the State Veterinarian (phone: 608/224/4886), official identification, a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and meet Wisconsin requirements for interstate movement (ATCP 10.55).

Cervidae originating from **Michigan and Minnesota** must have a permit and require special Tuberculosis testing. Exhibitors should contact the Division of Animal Health at 608-224-4886 well in advance of the fair or exhibition to determine their testing requirements.

DOGS AND DOMESTIC CATS

Dogs and cats originating from within Wisconsin

Dogs over 5 months of age must have proof of current rabies vaccination.

Dogs and cats originating from outside Wisconsin

All dogs and domestic cats shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and have proof of a current rabies vaccination. See ATCP 10.80 for specific vaccination information.

CIRCUS, RODEO, RACING AND MENAGERIE ANIMALS

All shall have a permit from the Department, and shall be isolated from all non-circus, non-rodeo, non-menagerie animals at the exhibition. They must meet current import requirements. Phone 608/224-4874 for a permit application. Fair managers: please note that this requirement applies to all animals belonging to midway attractions and rodeos.

ADVISORY FOR HOUSING NON-TRADITIONAL LIVESTOCK AND FOR MANAGEMENT OF OTHER ANIMALS WHILE THE FAIR IS UNDERWAY:

The Department makes the following recommendations, but these are not required by statute or administrative rule:

1. Exotic camelids (llamas, vicunas, alpacas, and guanacos) other exotic ruminants and Cervidae are not housed with domestic cattle.
2. Ratites (ostriches, emus, rheas, and cassowaries) should not be housed with domestic poultry.
3. Swine should not be housed with other mammalian species
4. Bovine viral diarrhea (BVD) is an infectious disease of cattle that can spread rapidly under the conditions of a livestock show. The Department strongly recommends that all breeding cattle exhibited at Wisconsin fairs be properly vaccinated against BVD at least 30 days prior to the show. Exhibitors should consult with their veterinarians regarding the proper choice of vaccine and the correct schedule for its administration.
5. Recommend that cattle be test negative for BVD-PI by immunoperoxidase test and negative for Johnes disease by the ELISA test.
6. Prohibit the use of common watering and feeding troughs.
7. Recommend all vehicles used to transport animals to and from the exhibition be cleaned and disinfected prior to and after use for this purpose.
8. Require all animals found to be afflicted with a contagious or infectious disease to be promptly removed from the premises.
9. Provide hand wash stations near all livestock facilities.
10. Recommend that all fairs add a space on livestock entry forms for the premises registration code.

Polk County Fair Livestock Exhibitor's Code of Ethics

Exhibitors of animals in livestock, poultry and small animal shows shall at all times conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition.

By entering an animal for exhibition at the Polk County Fair, the exhibitor consents to abide by the following guidelines:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, managerial agreement, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.

2. Owners and exhibitors shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians as required by the Animal Health Rules and Regulations of the Polk County Fair.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at the Polk County Fair.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of drugs. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing.
5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug which could affect the animals' performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, is prohibited. Exceptions will be made for external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal.
6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
8. No owner, exhibitor, shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics.
9. The act of entering of an animal in the Polk County Fair implies that the owner, exhibitor, has read this Code of Ethics and agrees to abide by these provisions.

Junior Division

Includes 4-H, FFA, FHA, Scout members and any other youth organization having adult leadership.

NOTICE TO ALL EXHIBITORS

1. This division is open to all boys and girls ages **8 through 19 as of January 1, current year**, who are members of 4-H, FFA, FHA, Scouts, and Youth Organizations in Polk County. All students in schools in Polk County or residents of Polk County, grades 3-12, can enter in Department 35J. **School work should be entered in Department 35J.**
2. Youth group members may enter in Junior Division or Open Division, but not both. **Youth enrolled in the Cloverbud program in order to be recognized as Cloverbuds must show in the Junior Division. If they choose to show as an open exhibitor, they cannot show in the junior division.**
3. All exhibits must be this year's work of member exhibiting. Members may enter only in projects enrolled in this year.
4. Entries are to be made under name of club, chapter, or organization. An exhibitor entering exhibits under more than one youth organization should complete an entry form for exhibits under each organization. **CAUTION:** An exhibitor may not enter more than one exhibit under any one lot number. Each exhibitor is limited to a maximum of twenty three (23) entries. Adult leader or instructor's recommendation will be required of each exhibitor by signature on the entry form. A 4-H leader cannot sign for FFA or FHA exhibits and a Ag-Ed instructor or Family Living instructor cannot sign for 4-H exhibits.
5. Exhibitors must turn in their completed entry form to leaders or instructors for checking and signature. The leader's or instructor's signature on the fair entry form verifies that the exhibitor is enrolled in the project (rule 3 above). All entries from a club, chapter, troop or group should be submitted together with complete youth organization summary form.

6. No entry fee will be charged in this division. Each exhibitor in this department is required to purchase only one Junior Exhibitor's season ticket at a cost of \$4.00.
7. **Please do not use pencils, magic markers or felt pens to fill out entry forms.**
8. Junior exhibitors must enter Music, Drama, Dance Revue, Computer Revue, Dog Show, Cat Show, Pet Pals, Cavies, Speaking & Demonstrations, Shooting Sports Event, and Aerospace Fly-Off, on entry form to be eligible for premiums.
9. Exhibits may be removed after 4:30 p.m. on the last day of the fair.
10. **JUDGING:** Exhibitors should check the judging schedules at the end of fair book to see the date, time, and type of judging (conference or Danish).
11. State statutes regarding consumption and possession of alcoholic beverages will be enforced at the fairgrounds. Any exhibitor found in violation of the statute will not receive premiums earned.
12. Read liability notice on page 12.
13. **Please read this section carefully as there have been significant changes with the addition of the Wednesday entry day.**

Exhibitors must bring exhibits to the appropriate building or conference judging area between 1 p.m. and 7 p.m. on Wednesday, July 29. The following are exceptions to this requirement:

1. Junior, open and senior citizen flowers and house plants (Dept. 15J, 15, 150) must be in place by 6 p.m. on Wednesday, July 29.
2. Dairy, beef and llamas must be unloaded and stalled by noon on Thursday, July 30. They may be brought in on Wednesday if desired.
3. Market hogs must be unloaded and in pens by 6 p.m. on Wednesday, July 29. The weigh-in is from 7-9 p.m.

All exhibits must remain in place at the fairgrounds until 4:30 p.m. on the closing day of the fair.

14. Additional breed recognition may be awarded to exhibitor. Opportunities will be posted in barns.

NOTICE TO ALL LIVESTOCK, ANIMAL AND POULTRY EXHIBITORS

1. Dairy, beef, horse, sheep, swine and goats stall rent - see page 10 of this book for amounts (include fees with your entry).
2. Vehicles are not to be parked around barns on Friday through Sunday. Park in designated areas only.
3. Refer to health regulations printed in the front part of this book. Read them carefully and follow them accordingly. Decisions of the fair employed D.V.M. are final.
4. All livestock must be owned or under managerial contract by the exhibitor since May 1 of this year. Animals must be shown by person who made the entry. In case of emergency, contact superintendent for permission to get a substitute showman.
5. All animals must be trained to lead and be under control of exhibitor or they will not be permitted in the show ring.
6. Any exhibitor not caring for livestock exhibit(s) shall be disqualified by the fair superintendents and/or directors from receiving premium money.
7. Club Herdsmanship awards will be given to dairy, beef, swine, sheep and horse. Judging will be based on originality, cleanliness, responsible animal care and exhibitor courtesy.

Exhibitors are prohibited from bringing extra fans or generators into the barns.

GUIDELINES, RULES, AND PROCEDURES FOR

2009 POLK COUNTY FAIR QUALITY MEAT PROGRAM

1. Any 4-H or FFA, FHA, Scout member, or any other organized youth group member 10 through 19 years of age as of January 1, 2009 enrolled in the beef, sheep or pork production project or enterprise may participate. All exhibitors must complete a fair entry form for Quality Meats animals.
2. A 4-H or FFA, FHA, Scout member, or any other organized youth group member may sell only one animal at the auction sale.
3. A member may enter more than one species; all entries must be weighed at fair. The animal to be sold must be selected after judging is completed or by 4:00 p.m. on Friday of the county fair.
4. A sale commission of 4% will be charged to cover program expenses and improvements to the Polk County Fair.
5. No drugs may be administered to animals at the fair or prior to the fair that would cause meat to be condemned. All withdrawal periods must be adhered to including administered medications and medicated feed. The exhibitor will not be paid for the animal if it is condemned.
6. A maximum of eighty five (85) animals will be sold. A maximum of thirty-five (35) steers will be allowed to sell. Twenty (20) lambs and thirty (30) hogs will be sold. If there should be a shortage in hogs, steers, or lambs, it will be made up from one of the other at the discretion of the Quality Meats committee. The judge's rank in the show will be used to determine eligibility to sell hogs, lambs, and steers. Steers, hogs and lambs will be intermixed by drawing sale order numbers at fair weigh-in. Decision of judge is final.

7. Animals will be allowed to cross the scale only once at the fair weigh-in. All entrants must turn in feed record and information sheets at that time. These sheets will be required for participation in the sale. Drug withdrawal sheets must be submitted at final weigh-in.
8. **All animals must be trained to handle at fair time or will be disqualified.**
9. Once an animal is sold, it becomes the property of the buyer. However, the exhibitor has the responsibility of caring for the animal until it leaves the fairgrounds. All animals are to remain in the barns until specified loading time (not before 4:30 p.m. Sunday.).
10. An exhibitor shall be determined ineligible to be in the Polk County Quality Meat Program if entered in a similar neighboring county fair Quality Meat Program.
11. Any exhibitor wishing to withdraw their animal from the auction sale must inform the Quality Meat Committee by 4 p.m. on Friday. The auction sale will be on Saturday at 6:00 p.m..
12. **All exhibitors are required to help set-up and tear-down the auction ring.**
13. All animals entering sale ring must be sold at the sale and must be slaughtered at the designated locker plant and entered in the carcass contest.
14. All carcasses will be evaluated for quality meat by using accepted carcass contest data.
15. All carcasses will be available for viewing at an educational meeting at the designated locker plant on Thursday following the fair. The meeting will include a carcass judging contest for any 4-H, FFA, FHA, Scout member or any other organized youth group member. The contest will include a class of 4 steer carcasses, a class of 4 lamb carcasses, and a class of 4 hog carcasses. The highest placing contestant will receive a trophy.
16. The Polk-Burnett Bankers Association will clerk the sale.
17. **All trophy winners must make weight, grade and be sold at the sale.**
18. Trophies or plaques will be presented to the following Sale Animals:
 - Buyer of the Sale Grand Champion of each species
 - Exhibitor of the Sale Grand Champion of each species
 - Exhibitor of the Sale Reserve Grand Champion of each species
 - Exhibitor of the Carcass Grand Champion of each species
 - Exhibitor of the Reserve Grand Champion Carcass of each species
 - Buyer of the Carcass Grand Champion of each species
 - Carcass judging contest winner
 - Exhibitor of the ADG Champion of each species
 - Exhibitor of the ADG Reserve Champion of each species
 - Exhibitor of the Total Performance Champion of each species
 - Exhibitor of the Total Performance Reserve Champion of each species
19. The Total Performance Champion of each species will be determined by adding the live animal placing, the carcass placing, and the average rate of daily gain placing for each animal. In case of a tie, the animal with the highest carcass placing will be the winner.
20. **An exhibiting family must submit the names of a minimum of 2 prospective buyers that were not buyers at the previous year's sale, and obtain their signatures. The Quality Meats Committee will provide appropriate forms for these signatures. Signature forms must be submitted at the final weigh-in at the fair.**

If the forms are not completed the exhibitor will not be able to sell their animal in the auction.

Each exhibitor will be provided with a list of names of all exhibitors in the project. These listings can be distributed to potential buyers. No coercion is to be used. A congenial relationship should be developed.

21. **All exhibitors selling an animal should use appropriate means to express appreciation to the buyer regardless of price received. The committee strongly recommends a thank you letter or an ad in the newspaper. All exhibitors should add the buyers' name to their exhibitor's stall card..**
22. The scale and all equipment owned by this program group can only be used for the Polk County Quality Meats Program.
23. Families with more than one member in the project may weigh in a designated family plan animal provided no member has weighed in more than one animal per species. Each family plan animal must be assigned to an individual exhibitor by the end of the weigh-in on entry day of the county fair.
24. **Exhibitors are required to attend one educational event pertaining to each species of animal that they weigh-in sometime during the calendar year before the auction. (If exhibiting beef, event has to pertain to beef, if exhibiting beef and swine, two events, one pertaining to each species must be attended, etc.)**

STEERS

1. Steers are weighed and tagged the first Saturday in December at the fairgrounds in St. Croix Falls from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.
2. **Steers should be reasonably halter-broken at the December weigh-in.**
3. **All steers must be dehorned and castrated by the December weigh-in. This rule will be strictly enforced.**
4. Only steers born after January 1, 2008 are eligible. Steers may be mouthed at weigh-in time at the fair to determine age.
5. **Exhibitor will be allowed to weigh and tag two steers in December. If tag is lost, contact the Polk County Extension Office IMMEDIATELY for tag replacement.**
6. All steers will be weighed in at the county fair on entry day at the designated time.
7. Steers must grade choice or prime to be eligible to be sold.
8. Steers must be the following weights to be sold:
 - Beef breeds and beef-dairy crosses; 900 pounds and over
 - Dairy steers (both parents and dairy breeds); 900 pounds and over
9. The order for loading steers for transportation to the locker plant will be in reverse of the sale order. (Last steer sold is first steer to be loaded.) This order will be announced at the sale. This order will be followed to prevent injury to animals, exhibitors or bystanders during the loading process.
10. All market steers will be ranked by a judge for total performance points.

HOGS (barrow or gilt)

1. Barrows and gilts are to be weighed and identified by tag (provided by the Quality Meat Committee) in April at the fairgrounds. Date to be announced. No more than two hogs are to be tagged per exhibitor at the April weigh-in. If the tag is lost, contact the Polk County Extension Office immediately. April weigh-in will be from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.
2. Maximum weight for hogs at the April weigh-in is 100 pounds.
3. Hogs must grade No. 1 or No. 2 to be eligible to be sold.
4. Hogs must weigh 225 pounds to be eligible to be sold.
5. All market hogs will be ranked by a judge for total performance points.
6. All hogs will be weighed in at the Polk County Fair.
7. Barrows and gilts must be born after January 1, 2009.

LAMBS (wether or ewe)

1. Lambs can be a wether or ewe and must be born after January 1, 2009.

Proof must be provided to the Superintendent that application for registration had been made at least 30 days prior to fair dates.

Sheep originating from within Wisconsin – Sexually-intact sheep of any age, and all other sheep 12 months of age and older must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official individual identification. Sexually intact sheep exposed to scrapie will not be allowed to exhibit.

Sheep originating from outside Wisconsin - All sheep shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. All sheep must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official individual identification. Sheep exposed to scrapie will not be allowed to enter Wisconsin.

Sheep to be shown in short fleece. Columbia's, Corriedales, Rambouillets, and Targhees to be shown in 2" or less of fleece on all parts of the body. All other breeds must not carry more than one inch (1") of wool on any part of the body. All market lambs must be slick shorn. The superintendent is to exercise reasonable judgment in the administration of this regulation.

- (1) A Spring Lamb is one born on or after February 16 of the exhibit year.
- (2) A Fall Lamb is one born between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year
- (3) A Winter Lamb is one born between January 1 and February 15 of the exhibit year.
- (4) A Mature ewe is one born before January 1 of the year preceding exhibit year.
- (5) A Yearling Ram or ewe is one born outside the date of birth limitations in subd. 1, 2 and 3. The age of yearlings may be subject to verification by a veterinarian's examination whose findings shall be final.
- (6) A Market Lamb is one born after January 1 of the exhibit year.
- (7) Pair of lambs will include one male and one female and shall include a spring lamb, winter lamb, or fall ram lamb and spring lamb, winter lamb, or fall ewe lamb owned by exhibitor.
- (8) Flock is comprised of 3 sheep consisting of a yearling or lamb ram, a ewe lamb, and a yearling, all of which are owned by the exhibitor.
