Goat Skillathon – open to exhibitors from noon – 1 p.m. on show day in the show ring. Skillathon sign-up at the fair.

Goats originating from within Wisconsin – Sexually-intact goats of any age, and all other goats 12 months of age and older must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official individual identification. Sexually intact goats exposed to scrapie will not be allowed to exhibit.

Goats originating from outside Wisconsin – All goats shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. All goats must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official individual identification. Goats exposed to scrapie will not be allowed to enter Wisconsin.

Goats originating from Modified Accredited states (**Michigan and Minnesota**) must have a permit number and require special tuberculosis testing. Exhibitors should contact the Division of Animal Health at 608-224-4874, well in advance of the fair or exhibition, to determine their testing requirements. Animals for exhibition from Modified Accredited states are required to return directly to the state origin after exhibition.

Junior Horse Show Superintendents – Rebecca Gray 294-2997; Horse Barn Superintendent - Deb Wilder, 268-6241.

Only horses staying all five days at the fair will be eligible for a tie stall that is five feet wide. A stall fee of \$1.00 per horse, plus a deposit check for \$25.00 made payable to the Polk County Fair Society, to be sent with fair entry form. The \$25.00 deposit check will be returned to the exhibitor on Sunday, August 2nd in the horse barn provided the horse has been at the fair all five days. Junior division exhibitors will receive stalls first. If there are any extra stalls, open class people will be considered.

HORSE BARN RULES TO BE POSTED

1. NO SMOKING, profanity or alcoholic beverages.
2. Aisles clean - no tack or cleaning equipment in stalls.
3. No running in barn.
4. **NO RIDING OF HORSES IN BARN - LEAD HORSE TO AND FROM SHOW RING.**
5. Horses and stalls must be clean at all times - bring fork, shovel, etc.
6. Each exhibitor may decorate their horse's stall – decorations must be taken down at the end of the fair.
7. Judging to be done daily - cleanliness, sportsmanship, decorating.
8. You must bring own hay, grain and bedding for your horse.
9. No one is allowed to sleep in the horse barn.
10. One horse per stall - no suckling foals in barn.
11. No horse should be beyond horse barn except when washing.
12. NO TANDEM RIDING – (except in practice area 30 minutes prior to tandem class).
13. Any **UNSPORTSMANLIKE CONDUCT** by an exhibitor or guardian will result in dismissal from remaining horse events at the fair, and loss of premiums.
14. You will be asked to leave by the superintendent of the horse barn if the rules are not followed.

Grade of exhibitor is as of January 1 of current exhibit year (2009).

Please check posting in the barn to obtain your stall assignment.

The Junior Division exhibitor may enter an animal or managerial animal provided the animal is under the care of the exhibitor by May 1, 2009. The exhibitor needs to provide the name of the animal (s) to the horse and pony project – Terri Rivard, 1832 45th Avenue, Osceola, WI 54020.

No one other than junior exhibitor should **ride** their horse (parents, trainers, other kids, etc.)

Stallions foaled before January 1, 2009 will not be allowed.

Suckling colts will be allowed in the ring only when being shown. When not being shown, they must be tied or confined.

Spurs are optional. Bats are allowed in games only. No whips will be allowed in Showmanship (English or Western). Refer to USEF rulebook for details regarding rules and dress code.

Exhibitors may show two horses but no more than one horse per lot number.

A horse may be used only once in any class at the show. (Grade levels are considered class divisions and not separate events). The exceptions to this rule are horses used in the horseless horse project, or a horse used in showmanship by two exhibitors of the same family.

All judged events qualify for District or State EXCEPT the Novice Horsemanship Class and Novice Pleasure Class and Walk Trot. To qualify for District 4-H Show, exhibitor must receive a blue or red at the County Fair. To qualify for State 4-H Show, exhibitor must receive a blue at the County Fair. To show at the State 4-H Show you must be in sixth grade or older as of January 1 of the current exhibit year for riding classes but for educational classes there is no age limit. There are no qualification requirements for timed events.

***Explorers may enter 102, 200, 300 OR 102, 202, 207, 302, 307 (NOT BOTH). In Games you may enter: 403, 406, 409, 412, & 415. These lot numbers must be entered on your fair entry form. All poultry and waterfowl must originate from flocks designated as U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or NPIP Affiliate flock and be accompanied by a NPIP certificate or originate from a Wisconsin Tested Flock or Wisconsin Associate Flock and be accompanied by an enrollment certificate provided by the department certifying that they are a Wisconsin Tested Flock or Wisconsin Associate Flock. Sexually mature birds that do not meet these requirements may qualify with documentation of a negative test for pullorum-typhoid (and Mycoplasma gallisepticum for turkeys) conducted within 90 days prior to arrival at the exhibition, and be individually identified with a wing band or leg band.

Turkeys that are not going directly to slaughter may not be commingled with other poultry. This may be accomplished by separate housing or controlling the air flow or placement and spacing to prevent movement of M. gallisepticum from other poultry to be the turkeys. The fair veterinarian should make this decision.

NOTICE: There will be NO testing done at the fair, to stay in compliance with the state regulations. Please have your birds tested prior to the start of the fair. No birds will be admitted without proper documentation.

TURKEY EXHIBITORS: Due to animal health regulations and rules turkeys will not be exhibited at the Polk County Fair in 2009.
